



New York State Assembly Districts and Asian Communities (2019)

Introduction

With the fastest percentage growth rates in the Asian population of New York State happening in upstate areas, this profile on the Asian communities for each of the State Assembly Districts in New York State expands upon the previous brief issued in 2012, which only covered New York City.

This profile is based on the data from the 2017 5-year American Community Survey from the U.S. Census Bureau, unless otherwise noted. For each district, this brief provides a snapshot of the Asian populations including disaggregated data by Asian ethnicities, the share of immigrants that make up the Asian population, the citizen voting-age populations for Asians, and the Asian languages most commonly spoken.

Overall Asian Population

Table 1 summarizes the Asian population data by Assembly Districts (ADs) in New York State. According to the most recent Census Bureau population estimates, in 2017, the Asian population in New York State reached 1.88 million, accounting for nearly 10 percent of the population. In 38 districts, at least one in ten residents was Asian.

Three Asian majority districts were in New York City. AD 40, centered in Flushing, Queens had the largest Asian population. AD 25, located along the Long Island Expressway around Fresh Meadows, Queens, was second and AD 49 in the Brooklyn neighborhoods of Bensonhurst, Dyker Heights and Sunset Park, was third. AD 125, which covers Cortland and Tompkins Counties, has the largest Asian population outside the New York metro area, with over 13,000 Asian residents.

Table 1 also shows the population of Asian immigrants residing in each district in 2017. Statewide, Asians comprise of 26% of all immigrants. In AD 40, Asians accounted for 79% of all immigrants, the largest percentage among all Assembly Districts. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 has the highest percent of Asian immigrants among all

immigrants populations, accounting for 54% of all immigrants in the district.

Finally, Table 1 summarizes Asian Citizen Voting-Age Population (CVAP) data in 2017. Overall, Asians comprise of over 6% of the total CVAP population in New York State. AD 40 has the highest percent of Asian voting-age citizens, accounting for 52% of the total CVAP in AD 40. AD 25 has the second largest percent of Asian voting-age citizens, accounting for 47% of the total CVAP while AD 49 follows with the third largest percent of Asian voting-age citizens, accounting for 46% of the total CVAP. Asians in the New York metro area comprised more than 10% of the CVAP in 30 ADs.

Outside the NYC metro area, AD 110, covering the north parts of the Capital Region including the city of Schenectady, and the towns of Colonie and Niskayuna, has the highest percent of Asian voting-age citizens, accounting for 5.2% of the total CVAP. AD 146, covering parts of Erie and Niagara Counties, was second with Asians making up 4.4% of the CVAP.

Highlights for Asian Groups

The overall Asian population numbers provided a mere snapshot on the realities facing Asian populations and may disguise the diversity and disparate residential patterns that underlie the Asian community. Table 2 presents the eighteen largest Asian ethnic group populations by Assembly District. This discussion in this section will highlight which ADs have the most population for these groups.

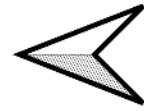
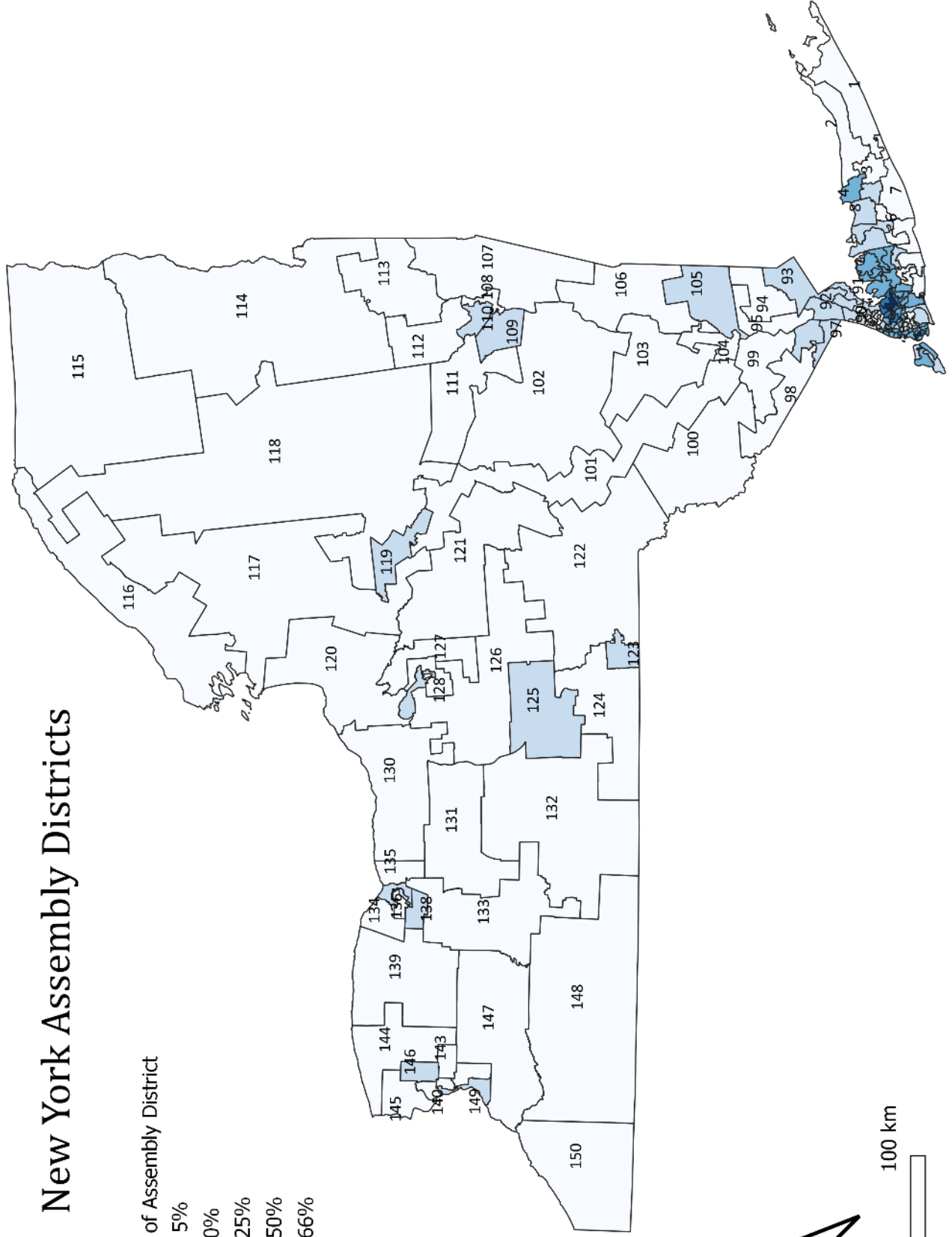
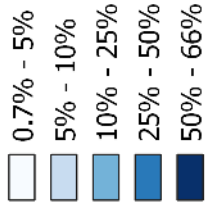
Bangladeshis were the sixth largest Asian group in the state, with more than 77,000 residents. AD 24, in the Queens neighborhoods of Jamaica, Woodhaven, and Douglaston, had the largest Bangladeshi community with 8,500 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 141, covering Erie County, was the home of the largest Bangladeshi population with close to 800 residents.

Bhutanese New Yorkers were mostly found in upstate areas, particularly in ADs 129 (Onondaga

Legend

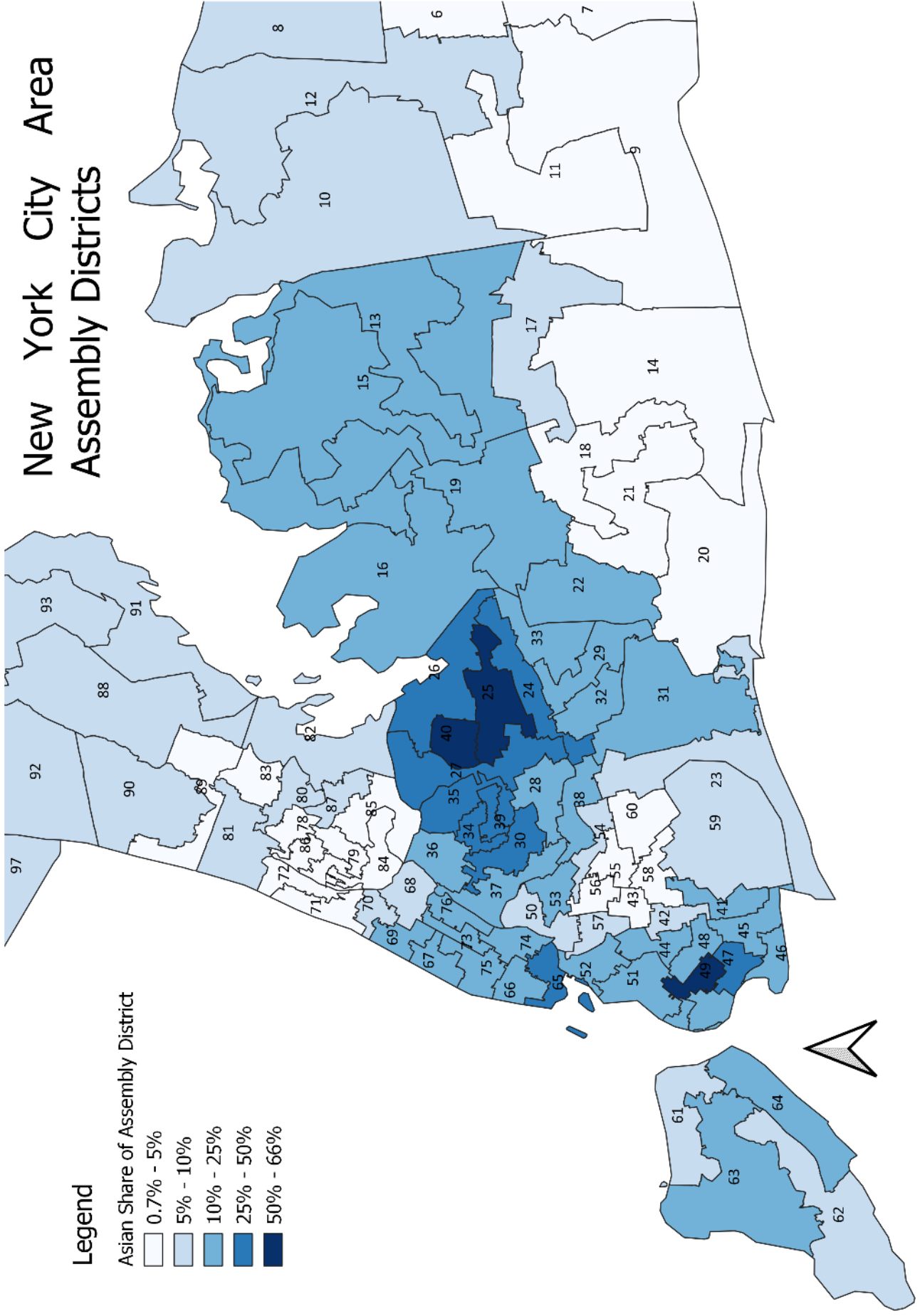
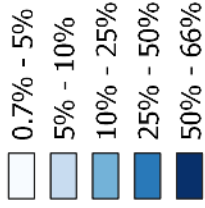
Asian Share of Assembly District

County), 136, 137, 138 (Monroe County), and 149 (Erie County).

Burmese residents were the tenth largest Asian group in the state, with more than 16,000 residents. The AD with the largest Burmese population was outside of the New York metro area, in AD 119, covering parts of Herkimer and Oneida Counties, with close to 3,200 Burmese residents. Within New York City, AD 35, in the Queens neighborhoods of Elmhurst and Jackson Heights, had the largest Burmese community with over 800 residents.

Cambodians were the fourteenth largest Asian group in the state, with over 6,500 residents. The largest Cambodian population was outside of the New York metro area, in AD 119 with over 1,100 residents. AD 83, in the Bronx neighborhoods of Williamsbridge and Eastchester, had the largest Cambodian community in New York City with over 800 residents.

Chinese residents were the largest Asian group in the state, with almost 739,000 residents.¹ AD 49 in Brooklyn had the largest Chinese community with over 62,000 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125, covering Tompkins and part of Cortland Counties, had the most Chinese with almost 6,000 residents.

Filipinos were the fourth largest Asian group in the state, with almost 144,000 residents. AD 24 in the Queens neighborhoods had the largest Filipino community with almost 4,900 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 109 in Albany County was the home of the largest Filipino population with almost 1,000 residents.

Indians were the second largest Asian group in the state, with nearly 410,000 residents. AD 24 had the largest Indian community with over 24,500 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 110, covering parts of Albany and Schenectady Counties, was the home of the largest Indian population with over 4,800 residents.

Of the 6,300 **Indonesians** in New York State, the largest portion were in AD 39 around Jackson Heights, Queens, with over 800 residents. No ADs in upstate New York had more than 150 Indonesians.

Japanese residents were the seventh largest Asian

group in the state, with almost 56,000 residents. AD 75 in the Manhattan neighborhoods of Chelsea, Clinton, Midtown, and the Garment District, had the largest Japanese community with over 2,400 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 was the home of the largest Japanese population with more than 700 residents.

Koreans were the third largest Asian group in the state, with more than 146,000 residents. AD 40 in the Queens had the largest Korean community with over 15,400 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 was the home of the largest Korean population with over 1,800 residents.

The largest **Laotian** communities (statewide population of 4,600) were found in upstate New York, particularly in ADs 123 (Broome County) and 137 (Monroe County).

Malaysian New Yorkers (statewide population of 4,000) were mostly found in New York City, particularly in AD 26 in Queens; and 65 and 74 in Manhattan.

Nepalese residents were the twelfth largest Asian group in the state, with more than 14,000 residents. AD 30 and 39 in Queens had the largest Nepalese communities each with more than 1,500 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 138, covering Monroe County, was the home of the largest Nepalese population with more than 1,000 residents.

Pakistani residents were the fifth largest Asian group in the state, with more than 88,000 residents. AD 44, in Park Slope and Borough Park, Brooklyn, had the largest Pakistani community with almost 5,900 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 110 was the home of the largest Pakistani population with almost 1,200 residents.

Sri Lankan residents were the thirteenth largest Asian group in the state with more than 7,000 residents. AD 61 and 63 in the Staten Island had the largest Sri Lankan communities each with more than 700 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 146 was the home of the largest Sri Lankan population with more than 200 residents.

Taiwanese residents were the ninth largest Asian group in the state with almost 17,000 residents. AD 25 had the largest Taiwanese community with almost

1,900 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 was the home of the largest Taiwanese population with almost 500 residents.

Thai residents were the eleventh largest Asian group in the state with almost 15,000 residents. AD 39 had the largest Thai community with almost 1,200 residents. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 119 was the home of the largest Thai population with close to 600 residents.

Vietnamese residents were the eighth largest Asian group in the state with more than 38,000 residents. The largest Vietnamese population in the state was in AD 129 covering Onondaga County with more than 1,800 residents. In New York City, AD 80 in the Bronx neighborhoods of Woodlawn, Williamsbridge, Baychester, and Morris Park, had the largest Vietnamese community with more than 1,500 residents.

Languages Spoken

Various Asian languages are spoken throughout the state. This section highlights some key data from Table 3 on the languages spoken in Assembly Districts. Due to new data disclosure restrictions, detailed data on Asian languages spoken by Assembly District was last reported in the 2015 5-year American Community Survey.

Chinese was the most common Asian language spoken in the state. However, the variety of dialects spoken in the state and the usage of traditional and simplified scripts presents further challenges when reaching out to the Chinese-speaking population. AD 49 in Brooklyn had the largest Chinese-speaking population at 57,346 speakers, followed by AD 40 in Queens with 46,890 Chinese speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 had the most Chinese speakers with 4,348. Among Asian languages, Chinese was mostly commonly spoken in 101 ADs. Seventy-five ADs had at least 1,000 Chinese speakers.

Other Indic Languages, the second most common Asian language category in the state, were represented mainly by Bengali (spoken by Indians and Bangladeshis), Punjabi (spoken by Indians and Pakistanis), and Nepali languages. AD 24, in Queens, had the largest number of speakers of other Indic languages with 16,847 speakers, followed by AD 34 in Jackson Heights, Queens with 10,717 speakers. Other Indic languages as a category was the largest Asian language group in 21 Assembly Districts. Thirty-six

ADs had over 1,000 other Indic languages speakers.

Using another Census Bureau source, the American Community Survey Public Use Microdata Sample (ACS PUMS), we can identify the specific languages spoken in counties and large cities, but not by legislative district. Using this data source, we find that the largest population of **Bengali** speakers outside New York City was in Buffalo with 1,700 individuals. The largest **Punjabi** speaking community upstate was in Erie County with almost 1,200 speakers. Concentrations of **Nepali** speakers could be found Syracuse (with 1,500 speakers), Monroe County (1,400), and Buffalo (almost 900).

Korean was the third most common Asian language in the state. AD 40 had the largest Korean-speaking population at 14,405 speakers, followed by AD 26 with 13,347 speakers and AD 25 with 9,816 speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 146 had the largest Korean-speaking population with 1,209 speakers. Twenty-four ADs had over 1,000 Korean speakers.

Many New York residents spoke an Asian language beyond the Asian languages reported separately. These residents were grouped into the category of **Other Asian Languages**, which was reported as the fourth largest Asian language group in New York State. AD 19, of Nassau County, had the largest number of these speakers with 3,482 speakers, followed by AD 45, of the Brooklyn neighborhood of Sheepshead Bay, with 2,185 speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 119 had the most speakers in this language category with 2,853.

Using the ACS PUMS data, we find that the “Other Asian Language” category in New York City primarily consisted of Malayalam, Tamil and Telugu, which are mostly spoken by Indians and Sri Lankans. Outside of New York City, **Malayalam** speakers were the largest language within this category, with populations concentrated in the suburban counties of Nassau, Rockland, and Westchester Counties with over 17,000 Malayalam speakers. Upstate counties outside of the metro area had large numbers of Karen (a group of languages spoken in southern Myanmar), Tamil, Tegulu, and Burmese speakers. Almost 3,300 **Karen** speakers, primarily recently arrived refugees from Myanmar, were found in the Greater Utica and Rome area, Buffalo, Albany, Syracuse, and Rochester. About 3,100 **Tamil** speakers were primarily in Monroe County and the Capital Region. Over 3,000 **Tegulu**

speakers were concentrated in the Capital Region, Monroe and Erie Counties. Over 2,900 **Burmese** speakers were mostly residing in Greater Utica and Rome area and Buffalo.

Arabic was the fifth largest Asian language group in the state. AD 64 in the Staten Island boroughs of Oakwood, Midland Beach and South Beach had the largest Arabic-speaking population at 4,614 speakers, followed by AD 46 in the Brooklyn neighborhoods of Dyker Heights and Bay Ridge at 4,071 speakers and AD 51 in the Brooklyn neighborhood of Sunset Park at 3,627 speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 149, covering Erie County had the largest Arabic-speaking population with 1,685 speakers. Eighteen ADs had over 1,000 Arabic speakers.

Tagalog was the sixth most common Asian language in the state. AD 39 had the largest Tagalog-speaking population with 4,027 speakers, followed by AD 30 with 2,901 speakers and AD 24 with 2,884 speakers. Twenty-three ADs had over 1,000 Tagalog speakers.

Urdu was the seventh most common Asian language in the state, mostly spoken by Pakistanis. ADs 1, 2, and 6 in Suffolk County as well as AD 22, in Nassau County, were the only ADs where Urdu was the most commonly spoken Asian language. AD 44 had the largest Urdu-speaking population with 4,210 speakers, followed by AD 22, in Nassau County, with 3,588 speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 110 had the largest Urdu-speaking population with 950 speakers. Nineteen ADs had at least 1,000 Urdu speakers.

Hindi, mostly spoken by Indians, was the eighth most common Asian language in the state. AD 18, in Nassau County, was the only AD where Hindi was the most commonly spoken Asian language. AD 33 in the Queens neighborhoods of Queens Village and Douglaston, had the largest Hindi-speaking population with 2,374 speakers, followed by AD 15 in Nassau County with 2,265 speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 146 had the largest Hindi-speaking population with 1,062 speakers. Eighteen ADs had at least 1,000 Hindi speakers.

Japanese was the ninth most common Asian language in the state. AD 75 had the largest Japanese-speaking population with 1,731 speakers, followed by AD 93, in Westchester County, with 1,693 speakers, and AD 66 in the Manhattan neighborhoods of West Village, Tribeca, and Greenwich village with 1,358

speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 125 had the largest Japanese-speaking population with 381 speakers. Nine ADs had over 1,000 Japanese speakers.

Vietnamese was the tenth most common Asian language in the state. ADs 129 and 80 were the only ADs with over 1,000 Vietnamese speakers at 1,172 and 1,906 speakers, respectively.

Gujarati, mostly spoken by Indians, was the eleventh most common Asian language in the state. AD 16, in Nassau County, was the only AD with over 1,000 Gujarati speakers. Outside of the New York metro area, AD 123, covering Broome county, had the largest Gujarati-speaking population.

The remaining Asian languages reported separately by the Census Bureau were Khmer, Thai and Lao. , the largest of these remaining groups, was spread throughout New York State, with the largest number of **Thai** speakers in AD 39 around Jackson Heights. **Khmer** speakers were largely found in the Bronx in New York City and the Utica and Rome area, with smaller communities in Syracuse and Rochester in the upstate region. There were more **Lao** speakers in upstate regions of Monroe, Erie, and Broome Counties than in New York City.

Notes

Beginning with the 2000 Census, the Census Bureau collects and reports multiple responses to the race and ethnic categories for most of their censuses and surveys. This report chose to define anyone who identifies in whole or in part as Asian to be Asian American. As a consequence, adding across race and ethnic categories in the data table presented here would result in multi-racial individual being overcounted. For example, someone who identifies as Chinese and Filipino would be included in both the Chinese and the Filipino population totals in table 2. Therefore, adding the total populations for all Asian groups listed in table 2 for a district would result in a total that was higher than the actual number of Asian respondents in a district.
