- Electioneering & What Nonprofits Must Avoid
 - 501(c)(3)s cannot endorse, oppose, or contribute to political campaigns.
 - Public statements, campaign donations, and nonprofit resources cannot support candidates—violations risk tax-exempt status.
- Campaign Finance Laws & How They Impact Nonprofits
 - NYC/NYS matching funds amplify small donations, but nonprofits with registered lobbyists face strict contribution limits.
 - Bundling donations (collecting multiple contributions for a candidate) triggers extra compliance requirements.
- 501(c)(3) vs. 501(c)(4): What's Allowed
 - 501(c)(3)s can do nonpartisan voter engagement but cannot engage in political campaigns.
 - 501(c)(4)s can lobby, endorse candidates, and fund election ads, but donations are not taxdeductible.
- Participating in Elections With Guardrails
 - Nonprofits can host candidate forums but must invite all candidates and remain neutral.
 - Ballot measure advocacy = lobbying, not electioneering— allowed but must be tracked.
 - Certain federal grants (AmeriCorps, CDBG, Head Start) prohibit nonprofits from conducting voter registration.
- Hosting or Interacting with Political Candidates
 - Candidates may visit but cannot campaign discussions must focus on the nonprofit's mission.
 - Galas & Events: Elected officials must be invited in their official capacity, and all candidates must be included.
 - Employees running for office require clear policies on resource use, media representation, and unpaid leave.

TIPS FOR NONPROFIT LOBBYING

- The "Candidate Visit" Rule Has an Exception
 - A candidate can visit your nonprofit, but only if they don't talk about their campaign and all candidates are invited.
- Doing Advocacy Without "Lobbying"
 - Educating lawmakers on an issue without asking for a specific action does not count as lobbying.
- Watch Out for "Bundling" Rules at Fundraisers
 - If your nonprofit staff organizes or collects contributions for a candidate, you may have to file additional paperwork.
- Timing Matters More Than You Think
 - The legislative calendar effects when lawmakers are more receptive—don't waste effort reaching out when they're busy with elections
- Hosting a Voting Site is a Safe Way to Get Involved
 - If your nonprofit wants to support elections without risk, hosting a polling place is a nonpartisan way to contribute.
